## **Quick Facts**

- You must be 12 or older to become an Air Cadet.
- Air Cadets are required to attend one evening of regular training per week, though many squadrons offer activities throughout the week and on the weekends.
- Air Cadets receive training in subjects such as flying and gliding, survival skills, physical fitness, public speaking, citizenship, and precision drill.
- Select cadets may participate in <u>summer courses</u> at training centres across Canada.
- Air Cadets are under <u>no obligation</u> to join the Canadian Forces.
- There is no set cost to join.
   Certain provinces may require registration fees, while others may not.
